## Recreational Meeting: Language with Mayra Rodriguez-Castro

An anonymous poetry workshop. Upon entering the session, participants turn off their ameras and rename themselves according to a choice they have made prior to the session. The facilitator reads a script written by Rodriguez-Castro and assigns each name a prompt for writing, which is voluntarily shared after a writing period.






